Transfer Station

July was a month of construction at the Transfer Station: Construction company will grade gravel in front of the HazMat/Swap Shop building so that rain water will run away from the front of the building rather than into the building. Lake Litchfield will disappear after grading that area and the road to the leaf area. There will be a ramp constructed on the roadway near the leaf area so the frontend loader can get high enough to dump leaves into a high walled trailer that will transport the leaves. Our next project will be to dig a ditch from the Transfer Station office, going around the back of the Swap Shop building and then to the HazMat trailer. Electrical conduit and wire will be put into the ditch so as to have electricity and lights in the HazMat trailer. I would like to thank the citizens. Town of Litchfield Selectmen and employees for their support of the Litchfield Transfer Station. We had a great Town Meeting!

Litchfield Broadband Committee

The Litchfield Broadband Committee would like to thank everyone that attended the July town meeting for supporting our efforts to bring better internet and more options to the residents of our town. We have been a very busy committee and have the following updates for you:*We have secured a planning grant for \$8250 from ConnectME with \$8250 town matching funds to define where our broadband gaps and coverage are in town. *We are presently applying for a \$15,000 Maine Community Foundation grant and hope to help the Senior Center and Town Hall get updated technologies to improve communications and access. We are looking to define new areas for hotspots and towers for more internet providers to bring services to us. *We continue to work with surrounding towns to enhance services that will be offered to our region. With a regional approach, we can be more financially attractive to Internet Service Provider (ISP) vendors. We have also started to reach out to our school district to ensure we are all moving in the same direction to ensure that our students have access to the internet for education/ homework. With Covid 19 and all the uncertainty surrounding the upcoming school year, we want to offer the support of our committee to their efforts. The committee is always looking for feedback and additional members to assist us. Conservation News

As we are enjoying our summer lake time to swim, boat and relax in the cool breez-

es, keep in mind that the clarity of the water and the health of the lakes depends on

through erosion, deforested trees, cleared lots, and poorly maintained roads, phosphorus and other harmful pollutants are able to enter the water directly. Left unchecked, these pollutants can cause unsightly (and potentially hazardous) algae blooms to grow out of control. Since the passing of the Clean Water Act of 1972, there has been a significant reduction in "point source pollution": pollution caused directly by industrial manufacturing and energy production. Today, most water pollution is the result of "non-point source pollution"—the cumulative impact of residents and visitors of the watershed. How can the Friends of the Cobbossee Watershed help me "Slow the Flow"? 1. Schedule a LakeSmart Start! visit. We'll discuss your concerns, and provide a plan of action. 2.
