Fortunately none of the fragments were identified as invasive species. The importance of these inspections cannot be overstated, as many lakes in our area have invasive plant infestations. Conservation News

The Conservation Commission and Smithfield Plantation held two activities with the RSU4 schools in October, a Timber Harvest Field Trip at Smithfield Plantation for the fourth grade and an Oak Hill Middle school volunteer work day at the Community Park called A Day of Caring. Fall is For Planting! As you do your outdoor work this fall consider adding native plants so you end up with a higher percentage of native plants and a smaller amount of exotics. And how much can you do in the fall besides planning? The best time to transplant deciduous trees and shrubs is when they are dormant, that is, when the leaves are about to or have fallen off up until new growth begins, about late April. Trees or shrubs that are not in the right place can easily be dug up now and moved to where they can reach their full size and shape. We learn if a plant has too much shade, for example, if it leans towards the sunlight. You can plant new trees and shrubs with their root ball intact until the ground freezes, into December. Through mid-October or so you can divide perennials, meaning the soil falls off the roots as you pull them apart and replant the smaller pieces, sometimes throwing out dead or woody parts; later in the season you can move perennials with a root ball. Fall also shows up the many exotic invasive species around town. Honeysuckle keeps its green leaves late, barberry and burning bush have bright fall color, multiflora rose has lots of red 1/4" fruit, bittersweet vine is a yellow 'curtain' covering some trees. Either cut and dab with a tiny amount of herbicide or cut to 12-15' and cover with a HD garbage bag tied at the base so the shrubs die from lack of sun light.

Mass Gathering Ordinance Committee—A committee was formed at the Oct 10th Select Board meeting with the charge of drafting an ordinance that would govern mass gatherings. If you would like to be considered for appointment to that committee please contact the Town Office, 268-4721. 2019-20 Property Taxes—Tax bills were mailed in September with 1st installment due by Oct 15th. If you are a Litchfield property owner and have not received a property tax bill you can call the Town Office, or check our tax commitment book online at Litchfieldmaine.org. By state law, tax bills are mailed to whoever owned the property prior to April 1st. If you purchased your property after April 1st, you are still expected to pay the taxes., but the bill was mailed to the previous owner. If your taxes are escrowed, standard practice is that the mortgage company will contact the Town Office to determine the amount due.

2020 Dog Licenses—You may license your dog(s) for 2020 at the Town office beginning October 15th or online at https://www1.maine.gov/cgi-bin/online/dog_license/index.pl. If rabies vaccinations are due please bring a copy of the new vaccination. To avoid a late fee your dog must be licensed by January 31, 2020. A rabies vaccination clinic is scheduled for Saturday, November 9th from 9 – 11am at the central Fire Station. Cost is \$20 with \$5 going toward start-up of the Litchfield Fuel Fund.

Portland, ME -- The Maine Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry (DACF) is reporting

that emerald ash borer (EAB), a destructive forest insect from Asia, has been detected in Cumberland

County. Officials with the USDA Animal and Plant Health and Inspection Service (APHIS) have con-

firmed the identification of an adult beetle found on a trap in Portland, Maine. An initial look by City

and Department staff did not reveal additional signs of the insect. Further surveys are planned during

The new find is likely the result of firewood transport into the area, since the closest known infestation is over 40 miles away in Lebanon. On their own, the beetles only travel 1/2 to 2 miles a year. The City of Portland, known as the "Forest City," has had an active urban and community forestry program for over 100 years and has already done much work to prepare for this destructive pest and other forest threats. Emerald ash borer was first discovered in the Detroit, Michigan area in 2002, though it is believed to have arrived in the 1990s. The beetle is about one half an inch and metallic green. Its larvae tunnel through the wood just under the bark of ash trees (Fraxinus spp.) and can kill even healthy trees in 4-5 years. Tens of millions of trees across the country have been killed. Ash trees comprise 4% of Maine's forest and are an important street and shade tree. Emerald ash borer threatens all species of ash trees (but not mountain-ash) and can have significant ecological and economic impacts. There are no practical means to control EAB in forested areas, although pesticide treatments can protect individual trees. Biological control, in the form of tiny, non-stinging wasps that attack EAB, has been started in Maine with releases in forested areas in
