Litchfield Fire & Rescue News - There will be a First Responder class here in Litchfield at our Central Station starting in September. The cost of the course will be borne by the Department. We gained 5 great, new First Responders the last time we held the class and we would like to get at least that many again. Medical emergencies outnumber fire calls by more than two to one, between 250 and 300 per year. With only ten or so First Responders on our roster, the workload is demanding. More First Responders will lighten the load for each of them. Anyone interested in joining this group of dedicated people can drop by the station on the 1st, 3rd and 4th Tuesday evenings each month or on Saturday or Sunday mornings to get more information. On the Tuesdays, we are at the station from six-thirty to eight or nine PM and from eight to nine AM on Saturdays and Sundays. Code Enforcement Officer - is tasked with driving around town checking things out. This is done mostly in the Spring and fall. The 2 major issues that inevitably crop up are first building without a permit; The Town of Litchfield Land Use Ordinance and the Town of Litchfield Shoreland Zoning Ordinance require a property owner to receive a permit before starting many projects. It is much easier to get the required permit before you start because if a project is found without a permit, the fee for that permit doubles after the fact. The second issue is having an unpermitted or illegal junkyard and/or auto graveyard. The definition or a junkyard and/or auto graveyard right out of the Town of Litchfield Land Use Ordinance states; Automobile Graveyard and Junkyard- A yard, field, or other area used as a place of storage for three or more unserviceable, discarded, worn-out or junked motor vehicles as defined in Title 29-A MRSA Section 101, subsection 42, or parts of such vehicles; Discarded, worn-out or junked plumbing, heating supplies, household appliances and furniture; discarded, scrap, junked lumber; or old or scrap copper, brass, rope, rags, paper, trash, rubber debris, waste, and all scrap iron, steel, and other scrap ferrous or non-ferrous material. Automobile graveyard does not include any area used for temporary storage by an establishment or place of business that is primarily engaged in doing auto body repair work to make repairs to render a motor vehicle serviceable, Temporary storage shall not exceed 90 days. Automobile graveyard includes an area used for automobile dismantling, salvage and recycling operations.

State Law also states in M.S.R.A. Title 30A Section 3751; 1. Automobile Graveyard. "Automobile graveyard" means a yard, field or other outdoor area used to store 3 or more unregistered or uninspected motor vehicles, as defined in Title 29-A, section 101, subsection 42, or parts of the vehicles. "Automobile graveyard" includes an area used for automobile dismantling, salvage and recycling operations.

Invasive Plant Rules in Effect - "The Maine Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry (DACF) has adopted rules to prohibit the sale and distribution of thirty-three terrestri-

al plants that were deemed invasive. The plants were reviewed by a specially-convened committee of horticulture professionals, land managers, foresters, wildlife biologists and other sci-

entists. The new rule went into effect on January 14, 2017, but the prohibition of sales does not

begin until January 1, 2018. The plants on this list have invaded farms, fields, forests and wet-

lands throughout the state," said Commissioner Walt Whitcomb. "Although many were origi-

nally promoted with good intentions, such as, the prevention of soil erosion or to support wild-

life, they have spread throughout Maine to the detriment of native species. In many places they have come to dominate forests, wetlands, fields and local landscapes, excluding native plants that support our economy and natural area.
