Litchfield Broadband Committee

As noted in the May Sodalite, the Town of Litchfield sent out a Request-For-Proposal (RFP) to determine the best partner to support a broadband build-out of the unserved areas here. We have received four proposals that are currently under review by the Broadband Committee, the Select Board, and the Town Manager. The good news is that all four companies have shown experience and capabilities in providing such services to other rural towns like Litchfield. In addition, all are actively pursuing the town to be selected. The challenges presented to us now involve review of the four different approaches that have been proposed. These differences include: 1) Ownership of the infrastructure; 2) Town infrastructure contribution dollars to the project; 3) Quality of Service; 4) Speed of Service (download / upload speeds offered); 5) Pricing per month per subscriber (can vary by speed selected); 6) Technology - Fiber / cable / fixed wireless; 7) Technology lifecycle (is the offering futureproof for longer-term anticipated needs?); 8) Required time (months) to implement their proposal - time to connect the unserved; 9) Other considerations - such as other bundled services, customer service support, etc. Fully aware that every day some of us and our neighbors are hanging on without service, we are attempting to make very thorough decisions in as short an amount of time as possible. In the very near coming weeks, we will be in a better position to provide more details on what the finalists offer, and will look for town comment before selecting a final partner. Your inputs are always welcome. Please feel free to contact the Broadband Committee through the Town Hall staff. Thank you.

If you would like to join the committee, please submit a letter of interest to the Select Board, as we currently have two positions available. One of our first priorities will be performing an updated survey of the roads, last completed in the spring of 2019. This survey will provide objective data that will be used to make recommendations of priority to the Select Board. I know many of you that came to Town Meeting were passionate about some of the roads that need attention, and we will be doing our best to address the most problematic roads first. Tacoma Lakes Association

Are you concerned about the future of the Tacoma Lakes? Do you want to know more about the situation with the Woodbury dam? Do you want to learn more about what the association does? Would you like to become a member of the association? Please join us for the TLA Annual Meeting July 10, at 9 a.m., in the "red barn," at the Litchfield Fairgrounds. We will provide answers to the above questions and more. Our membership drive is under way, and our goal is 300 members. Your \$15 membership dues help fund boat inspectors at the Woodbury boat launch throughout the summer. The inspectors are not volunteers, but people trained to spot possible invasive plants on watercraft entering and leaving our lakes. The cost of this program has increased each of the last three years, and the more members we have, the more inspectors we can have to help protect our lakes. Membership dues also help fund our volunteer plant patrol team. Although they are volunteers, the association provides the equipment needed to complete their inspections. New this year, is a canoe that has been fitted with a clear panel in the bottom of it, enabling inspectors to have a better view of the lake bottom in the shallow areas where invasive plants can take root. We appreciate every returnable bottle that is donated to the TLA at the Litchfield Transfer Station!! Volunteers pick up the returnables and transport them for redemption, therefore we ask that you PLEASE BAG YOUR RETURNABLES. It makes the volunteers' job so much easier, and helps keep their vehicles clean. We hope to see you on July 10.

then Simard has become a professor in forestry at UBC, and has continued to do groundbreaking scientific research into mycorrhizal fungi networks, finding that trees have complex ways of distributing nutrients and supporting each other, and that forests behave as a single organism. Her research has been replicated elsewhere and her ideas have become mainstream. But not in government or the forest industry, where the implications of her work would upend the way trees are grown and harvested. In her 2016 TED Talk, Simard states that "forests are not just trees, they are complex systems of hubs and networks that overlap. They are vulnerable, not only to natural disturbance but to high-grade and clear-cut logging. You can take out one or two hub trees but there comes a tipping point." She says arrival at that tipping point is being hastened by climate change, and that Canadian forests are now net emitters of carbon, where they used to be a carbon sink. In other words, they are losing more carbon than they are gaining. "And that's huge on the world stage," Simard says. "You can actually mitigate the loss of carbon from these sites by partial cutting, because you don't lose nearly as much and you can actually keep it in the ground and keep it in the trees." "There's more and more research that's been done that shows biodiversity is correlated with productivity and health of ecosystems across the
