Tacoma Lakes Association

Transfer Station

We have a new vender at the Transfer Station: Kelly Brothers Disposal won the contract to haul our recyclables and the Bulky containers. They are doing an outstanding job! The "snow birds" have started to return to Town and being open on Sundays helps to accommodate the increase in use of the Transfer Station. An example of the increase in the volume being seen at the Transfer Station, we have had the material in the Bulky containers crushed with a backhoe on Friday, Saturday and then again on Monday. One individual made eight or nine trips to the Transfer Station with a pickup full of mattresses and large furniture. The Swap Shop is open and doing fantastic! If you have items that you don't want but they are too good to just throw away, bring them to the swap shop to be recycled. We are still having a problem with people putting items in the wrong containers: attendants check the containers every ten minutes and constantly remover items that obviously are not suppose be in that container (like a metal toaster in the Plastic container).

Litchfield Broadband Committee

The goal of the Town of Litchfield Broadband Committee is to support the Select Board in bringing quality, affordable broadband service to all households and businesses in town. Back in late April, the Broadband Committee sent out a Request for Proposal to a dozen internet service providers (ISPs) doing business here in Maine - including to the incumbents Spectrum and CCI. The purpose of the RFP was to determine the best partner to support a build-out of the unserved areas here. Bidders were provided a copy of the town broadband Planning Report. (The RFP and Planning Report are currently available for public viewing at the Town of Litchfield website homepage). Based upon that RFP, four ISPs have formally notified us of their intentions to submit a bid. The bids are due back by June 8, with a Bid Opening by the Select Board expected on June 10 (time TBD). Finalists are expected to be named in late June, and a Bid Award is expected to be made soon thereafter. Once a direction has been determined and an ISP has been chosen, the Broadband Committee will pursue Federal, State, and Kennebec County Broadband Infrastructure grants that have been made available to rural areas in recent months. In addition, contract negotiations between the town and the chosen ISP will commence. Further details related to the infrastructure buildout will be announced as more information becomes available.

Application Deadline Extended for Homestead and Veteran Exemptions By State guidance, homestead and veteran exemption applications for the upcoming tax year will be accepted until property taxes are committed in early September. If you have lived in your home for at least one year as of April 1st, you can still submit an application to have \$25,000 of the valuation of your home exempted from property taxes. Veterans generally must be age 62 or over to qualify for an additional \$6,000 exemption.

Conservation News

So, you've decided to plant native plants in your garden and want to learn more about which plant is right for your site. Perhaps you've heard "Right plant, right place" as a phrase to help you remember to put a plant where it will be able to thrive for its long life. Maine Audubon has a beautiful and helpful guide called "Maine Native Plant Finder" with filters for bloom time, sun needs, size, and wildlife benefited. To find it search "Maine Audubon native plants". Maine Audubon sells native plants starting June 1 which you can order on line in advance. They are located at 20 Gisland Farm Road, Falmouth. Native Tree: Oaks (Quercus spp.) are a common forest and ornamental tree in Maine. They provide food for a diversity of wildlife—from insects to birds to mice to bears. The wood is used in many applications, it is hard, strong and relatively dense. There are eight oak species native to Maine, it is a genus whose numbers are projected to increase with climate change. The most abundant is northern red oak (Quercus rubra), with almost 190 million stems over one inch diameter estimated by the 2018 state forest inventory. In addition to native oaks, there are many species used in plantings around homes, cities and towns. In these settings they can reach massive sizes and provide shade and add visual appeal. -Maine Department Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry
